A dozen years after No Child Left Behind, our schools, districts, and states are being held accountable for weak, limited, and standardized measures of math and reading skills only. Standardized test scores are being used in an unprecedented way to decide the fates of states, districts, students, schools, teachers and principals. Tests and test prep are increasingly coming to define school for millions of students, with the most intense consequences falling on schools that serve the most vulnerable. Her latest book, *The Test: Why Our Schools Are Obsessed with Standardized Testing, But You Don't Have To Be* posits a debate is raging over whether students take too many tests, the quality of the tests themselves, and whether the stakes are too high. How do we fix this and build a future of better tests and real accountability? To answer that question, we need to think deeply about what all children really need to be happy and successful.

Ms. Kamenetz will describe how these tests incorrectly conceptualize "proficiency" as a fixed quantity in a world where what really matters is your ability to grow and learn. There is a lot of "noise" in the tests, too, as the characteristic they measure most strongly is poverty, not achievement.
