This new book weaves together eighteen essays that explore the legacy of slavery in present-day America with thirty-six poems and works of fiction that illuminate key moments of oppression, struggle, and resistance. Prof. Hannah-Jones will be in conversation with historian and award-winning, bestselling author Carol Anderson, Ph.D. (FAN '21), the Charles Howard Candler Professor and Chair of African American Studies at Emory University. FAN hosted Prof. Anderson in May 2021 in support of her book The Second: Race and Guns in a Fatally Unequal America. Prof. Anderson contributed an essay to The 1619 Project.
